Attendance

- Whole school FSM6 attendance was 86.4% which is higher than the National Average of 85.8% according to FFT Aspire. (This is with COVID related absence included).
- Of particular note is the attendance difference between Year 11 FSM6 pupils at Cox Green at 90.0% and the 83.5% of the National Average in Year 11 which is a 6.4% difference.
- In Year 8 and 10 (current Year 9 and 11) is where more work needs to be done to improve the PA students where the attendance figure for both years is 1% below the National Average for FSM6 students.
- Overall the Cox Green PA percentage score is 29% below the National Average of 30%.
